LETTER FROM THE CEO & BOARD CHAIR



Making a positive difference in the wellbeing and the life journey of children, youth and families is the mission of FIREFLY. In this everchanging world, the perspectives of children, youth and families living in the northwest guide our mission. They are our greatest teachers. Their experiences and hopes inspire us to go above and beyond to improve the quality of care.

Early this year, thanks to the feedback received from clients, staff and community partners, FIREFLY launched a new strategic plan. At the core of this plan are quality commitments to our children and families, staff, and communities across the region. These commitments are reflected in our activities this year.

The Annual Report details the breadth of FIREFLY services and the quality commitment of our staff. To highlight, service access was streamlined through applying LEAN quality improvement approaches for mental health and an online booking system was established for FIREFLY families. Online parenting programs, regional autism support groups for children youth and parents, picky eaters workshops, all gender Dialectical Behavior Therapy group and summer camps provided additional supports.

Services for early years mental health grew. In partnership with the Lake of the Woods District Hospital, our complex feeding and swallowing clinic was expanded. Voyce interpreter services were engaged to support connected, safe, equitable and responsive services for clients. Significant investments were made in building capacity through training in pediatric mental health EMDR, Reflective Family Play, change management, LEAN Six Sigma process improvements as well as support for staff in use of data dashboards to track service progress and guide decision making. In partnership with Fort Frances Canadian Mental Health Association and the Lake of the Woods District Hospital we were thrilled to integrate the voice of families as experts with the hire of a Parenting Support Worker. Renovation of the prior Cameron Bay childcare space began this year to accommodate new speciality services designed with clients' well-being top of mind. Finally, FIREFLY continued to champion for children, families, and communities with many valued local, regional, and provincial partners, strengthening our collective goal of service excellence for children.

We are proud of our staff and the high-quality services they provide. We are grateful for the dedication and wisdom of our volunteer **Board** guiding us forward. Looking ahead, we remain committed to continuing to adapt, listen and learn from children, families and communities, youth, taking these lessons with us into the future. We thank you for your trust, leadership, service, support, partnerships. We are steadfast in upholding our quality commitments for brighter futures.

KENORA RENOVATIONS

In 2023 FIREFLY began renovating the former Cameron Bay Childcare Centre in the Kenora location in order to continue offering more specialized services closer to home. A soft launch saw clients using the spaces in early February, 2024 with an official Grand Opening held in April, 2024. Thank you to everyone who was involved with this process, the feedback about the renovations has been wonderful, and we look forward to continuing to offer new services out of this space.





WARM AND WELCOMING

FIREFLY collaborated with staff, families, and clients to craft inviting, non-clinical environments. This included a reception area, spacious waiting room, client/caregiver library, three treatment rooms, a multipurpose area, and fully accessible washrooms. Inspired by the Canadian Shield and local flora and fauna, the design and color palette evoke the essence of rocks, earth, and trees. The space was specifically tailored to accommodate specialized services like child and youth psychiatry, seating and positioning, and augmentative and alternative communication.

WHAT'S NEW AT FIREFLY?

Ocean eReferral

We are proud to highlight Ocean, our online referral platform, which is revolutionizing how we can refer and receive referrals across our region, significantly reducing administrative burdens and minimizing errors. This seamless integration facilitates easier and more efficient referrals from community services and primary care providers to our services, enhancing overall healthcare coordination.

Triple P (Positive Parenting Program)

This is a program designed to provide information, space, and perspective to explore parenting. It allows people the ability to choose their own goals and then select and adapt Triple P parenting strategies to help achieve those goals.

We are thrilled to introduce our new client-focused appointment booking and notification system, which offers unparalleled flexibility, allowing clients to seamlessly schedule group or individual clinical appointments based on their availability. This innovative platform enhances client autonomy and also provides us with robust data to monitor trends and improve strategies around appointment attendance, including no-shows.

Early Years Mental Health

This service has recently been expanded for children 0-6 to offer enhanced early years mental health services including family-based interventions, play-based therapies, and caregiver groups in addition to support and skill-building for caregivers/parents.

Parenting Mental Health Support Worker

This new role offers both one-on-one support sessions as well as group sessions. Our Parenting Mental Health Support Worker provides a safe, non-judgmental, and confidential space for parents/caregivers to speak openly and honestly about their experiences supporting their loved ones with mental health struggles.

Autism Support Worker

This role helps support families of children with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) by referring to appropriate programs externally or within FIREFLY, assisting clients with completing OAP applications and other autism related funding applications, facilitating in-person and virtual Autism groups for children, youth and caregivers and more.

Voyce Interpretation













2023/24 Referrals to FIREFLY by Month




Yearly Referrals to FIREFLY Since 2018

The graphic above demonstrates the many ways clients receive services.





Clients Receiving CYDS Services by FIREFLY Site




Clients Receiving CYDS Services by Discipline





SPECIALTY SERVICES

PEDIATRIC CLINIC

The FIREFLY Pediatric Clinic offered at our Kenora site by Dr. Jennifer Coombs, Pediatrician, focuses on children and youth seeking consultation in the following areas:

- developmental delay in 2 or more areas,
- new behavioural concerns for Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD),
- new behavioural concerns for Anxiety,
- complex motor delay(s),
- concern for Autism (in children under 5 years of age), and
- Cerebral Palsy.

Note: to access these services, a referral must be submitted by a Physician/Nurse Practitioner

Future Plans: FIREFLY will continue to evolve the Pediatric Clinic and partner with local service providers to better meet the needs of clients within the region.





SEATING AND MOBILITY CLINIC

Referrals are now being received for clients requiring specialized support to address their seating and mobility needs. Occupational Therapists work with clients and local vendors to complete assessments and identify the best equipment and strategies to meet individual needs. Clients are then followed by their community team members with the support of the clinic team.

Future Plans: FIREFLY will continue to evolve service delivery throughout the region.

COMPLEX FEEDING & SWALLOWING CLINIC

This inter-professional assessment team includes Occupational Therapy, Speech-Language Pathology, and a Registered Dietitian, all with the expertise in complex feeding and swallowing difficulties. Clients are assessed through the clinic in partnership with their medical team and then followed by their community team members with the support of the feeding and swallowing team.

Future Plans: An increased role of Nursing and education as well as a move into a state-of-the-art clinic setting.





AUGMENTATIVE & ALTERNATIVE COMMUNICATION CLINIC (AAC)


This clinic supports clients in need of additional or alternative modes of verbal and written communication. Assessment, consultation, and education are provided by a Speech-Language Pathologist or Occupational Therapist who then supports the client's family and community team members to continue with the prescribed communication strategies.

Future Plans: Obtain funding as well as increased role for full complement of AAC Service team staffing and achieve General Level Assistive Devices Program (ADP) Clinic certification.

AUTISM SERVICES

In addition to our other programs and services, FIREFLY offers multiple Ontario Autism Program (OAP) specific services to clients in our region including: Caregiver Mediated Early Years, Entry to School, School Support Program, Urgent Response and Core Clinical Services (Mental Health & Behaviour Intervention).

Future Plans: Continue to prioritize diagnostic assessment and support families with linkage to service and resources through the expansion of our Autism Support Worker position.



AUTISM DIAGNOSTIC HUB

CLIENTS SERVED

FIREFLY provides Autism Spectrum Disorder diagnostic assessments through our regional Autism Diagnostic Hub, a partnership that was established with five regional services providers, and funded in partnership with Child and Community Resources. Diagnostic hubs provide timely access to multi-disciplinary diagnostic assessments and connect children and families with appropriate services in their community following an assessment. The Hub ensures that individuals and families in our region have access to timely, comprehensive, and culturally sensitive diagnostic services for Autism Spectrum Disorder.

Future Plans: Continue to advocate for annualized Diagnostic Hub funding, and work towards decreasing the average age of diagnosis so that critical early intervention is accessible.



CYMH SERVICES

SNAP[®] (STOP NOW AND PLAN)

SNAP®, which stands for Stop Now and Plan, is an evidence-based cognitive-behavioural model that teaches children struggling with behavioural issues, and their caregivers, how to manage their emotions and behaviour by getting them to stop, think, and plan positive alternatives before acting impulsively.







COORDINATED SERVICE PLANNING


Coordinated Service Planning supports families with children and youth with multiple or complex special needs. Coordinated Service Planning links families to services and ensures that all the professionals involved with the family are working together as a team.

ONE STOP TALK

Services are provided through an integrated network of infant, child, and youth mental health agencies across Ontario.

FIREFLY is a One Stop Talk service provider. One Stop Talk offers children, youth, and their families immediate access to free virtual mental health supports when and how they need them. The program provides single-session counselling support and ensures direct referral to additional services when needed.







TRIPLE P (POSITIVE PARENTING PROGRAM)

Triple P is a parenting program that provides parents and caregivers with a toolbox for parenting, allowing parents and caregivers the opportunity to choose the strategies they need.

Triple P is an evidence-based program built around knowledge of child psychology and best practice.

URGENT RESPONSE SERVICES

Urgent Response Service is a time-limited, rapid service response for children and youth with Autism, registered with the Ontario Autism Program (OAP). Eligible families can receive up to 12 weeks of services and support which are specifically designed to address a behaviour of concern.

This service is intended to address one specific high-risk behaviour need with a focus on preventing further escalation of risk of harm to self, others, and/or property.





EATING DISORDERS

FIREFLY offers Eating Disorders services upon receiving a referral where body image and/or disordered eating concerns are present, mental health services and dietitian services are offered to children, youth, and families. The Registered Dietitian works in partnership with the Counsellor to provide assessment and intervention to clients. The Registered Dietitian is available for in-house consultation when clinicians have queries regarding clients with body image and/or disordered eating concerns.

TELE-MENTAL HEALTH

Tele-mental Health is a Telepsychiatry program that allows for the provision of virtual psychiatric consultations from SickKids Hospital.







COMPLEX SPECIAL NEEDS

Complex Special Needs funding provides additional service(s) that fall within the Ministry of Children, Community, and Social Services' mandate to eligible children/youth whose complexity of need is beyond the capacity of the family and local services. This program aims to decrease health and safety risks of children/youth.

YOUTH JUSTICE SERVICES

Youth Justice Services are for youth who are aged twelve to seventeen years at the time they were involved in a crime. Services include a variety of cognitive-based behavioural interventions provided on an individual, family, and/or group basis. FIREFLY operates the Youth Mental Health Court Worker Program in Kenora and Dryden. This is a mental health diversion program which assists youth who are considered appropriate for diversion to access mental health services and support. FIREFLY also operates the Youth Justice Committee program in Dryden. This program offers an alternative to the formal court processes for young people, using a restorative justice approach stressing accountability and responsibility.





PARENTING MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT

RoxAnne Daignault works as the Parenting Mental Health Support Worker at FIREFLY. Through this partnership program she offers one-on-one as well as group sessions that focus on connecting all parents and caregivers in Northwestern Ontario to be able to share, feel heard, feel seen, and feel supported while caring for loved ones struggling with mental health.

Since inception in November 2023, 27 caregivers have attended one-on-one sessions, while 94 people have joined the group sessions.



RESPONSES FROM PARENTS/CAREGIVERS

This weekly meeting is filled with so much information. It's uplifting and educational and it's great to know that there are others who share some of their struggles and wins which in turn helps us.

REGISTERED DIETITIAN SERVICES

FIREFLY recognized the need to integrate a Registered Dietitian (RD) within its team in order to offer specialized eating disorders services closer to home. The RD, Kate Ronnebeck, works on both the Child & Youth Developmental Services team and the Child & Youth Mental Health team, allowing them to provide a continuum of care, from complex feeding and swallowing to eating disorder services.

FIREFLY plans to further the role and eating disorder services by the following key strategies:

Firstly, we prioritize ongoing professional development for our team members, ensuring they stay updated with the latest practices and approaches.



Secondly, we focus on bolstering the expertise of our mental health clinicians in eating disorder treatment. This includes actively encouraging their participation in specialized programs such as Family-Based Treatment (FBT) and Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for Eating Disorders (CBT-E).

Additionally, we are committed to refining our waitlist management procedures. This entails implementing triage systems based on urgency, offering 'while-you-wait' support protocols, and streamlining service contracting to reduce delays.


Finally, we are dedicated to bridging the gap between developmental services and mental health care, particularly for clients and families facing challenges such as Avoidant Restrictive Food Intake Disorder (ARFID) or extreme picky eating alongside Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) diagnoses. Our aim is to ensure that these individuals receive the comprehensive and tailored support they need.

EPISODE OF CARE - GREENBELT PROJECT

The Child and Youth Mental Health team started a Lean Six Sigma Green Belt project focused on clients' Episode of Care during the Summer 2022. Following a grant opportunity to work with the Knowledge Institute over the 2023 calendar year, the project team, comprised of Zoé Campbell, Vikki Healey, and Darcia Curtis, has worked through several tools to help define the problem, measure the current state, analyze the problem in depth and associated factors, and implement changes to improve the Client Episode of Care.

Initial changes were put in place July 2023, with data for the last quarter available (October 1st to December 31st 2023) showing that only 35.7% of clients had to wait for services and the average wait time, for those clients who had to wait for service, was 33 days. Anecdotally, clinicians have reported that the Episode of Care is clearer to both clients and clinicians. Clinicians have reported that there is a sense of relief and understanding that comes with being connected more quickly with a clinician, even when clients have to wait for further services.

Future Plans: Further data will be collected to ensure positive outcomes are maintained and unanticipated consequences are mitigated with an anticipated end date to the overall Green Belt project being May 31st 2024. A Monitor & Control plan will then be put in place to ensure the Episode of Care continues to run smoothly.


